AUTOBIOGRAPHY

Fr. Thomas Gillespie, 0.8.B.

My entrance to this world came on a bright and sultery July in 1937 at about eight in the morning. The place was St. Mary's Hospital and the city was Minneapolis, which I have called home for the past twenty years. Thave one sister who is one year older than I. I also have a younger sister and brother.

At five I was the only kid on the block to have five black eyes in two years and at that, two of them were at the same time. My older sister was a terror which accounted for three of them. I received the other two (both at the same time) standing too close to a playmate on a swing. After surviving these blows I managed to keep my eyes their normal blue.

Speaking of black there is another impression of black which remains in my memory. The black clothes of a priest, in fact of three priests in particular. If have two uncles and one cousin who are priests. One of my uncles, a missionary in China, is now dead. Having priests in the family, I suppose I was luckier than most kids who don't come into such close contact with them. However, I never thought about the priesthood, or at least I don't think I did, until I was in the eighth grade at Incarnation grade school in Minneapolis.

In the middle of my eighth grade year in school a Salesian priest came to stir up vocations. It was interested in his talk. He was a tall man of six feet or more. He had a crop of curley hair and a smile that would melt anyone. It had a private talk with him and he gave me a lot to think over. However, he advised me to go on to De La Salle and decide after I had finished high school.

D registered for De La Salle and spent my first two years of high school there. My marks weren't good during my sophomore year.

because I didn't have enough sense to study. I thought it was more fun to go out every night and have a good time with the gang.

I had a cousin who went to St. John's. He was a good Irishman like myself by the name of . He left for the Dominicans several years ago. He asked me if I would like to go to St. John's. I can't say I wanted to come here, but I started to think about it. The undercurrent of my thoughts told me that if I didn't go some place where the gang wasn't around, I would probably flunk out of De La Salle. This thought scared me. I liked it at home, but I thought I better get some studying done.

My parents brought me up to look at St. John's. I loved it the first time I saw it. I had a talk with Fr. Stanley. I guess I must have told him that I was thinking of the priesthood. My original intention was to enter St. Gregory's hall as a non-presthood student. That wasn't the way it turned out. Fr. Stanley put me in Bede Hall.

For the first couple of days it didn't make much difference, for I didn't know which hall was which. Finally I found out accidentally that I was studying for the priesthood. I don't know why I didn't go down and see Fr. Stanley and get changed. The more I thought about it the better I liked it, so I stayed in Bede Hall for two years.

Graduation came and passed and I moved over to the other side of the building and took up residence in St. Anselm Hall. By this time I had decided to be a Dominican, since that seemed the only order to join. I had been slightly influenced by the two Dominican priests and one Dominican num in the family.

It was during my second year in Anselm Hall that I decided to join the Benedictines. If can't give any definite reason for it. I suppose that for one thing I had gotten used to the place and had many friends whom I didn't want to say good-by to. Some of the monks also had some influence on me. I admired one priest in particular, having had quite a bit of contact with him during my two years in college.

Beside these few helps there have been no great inspirations or revelations which account for my entering the Benedictine Novitiate. I guess the idea of becoming a priest has always been in the back of my mind. I can recall no big things which drew me towards this life, except the grace of God and prayer.

Testimonium Magistri Novitiorum

Fr. Thomas sailed through several rough storms this year in which he almost lost his rudder. These tempests, without doubt, have been a most salutary experience for him. At least he understands now that he must navigate not by the drifting clouds of sentimentality, but by the stable star of duty. He springs from a family and relationship that expresses its affection by bestowing many and large material presents, and by paying compliments to each other. These past affectionate attentions, which in many instances catered too much to his desires, have made Fr. Thomas somewhat soft. Basically, he has a wholesome character, motivated with a desire for successful communal living. Therefore, he is happy when he succeeds in pleasing others, but becomes unduly sad when he senses a temporary misunderstanding with another. At such times, however, he does not become resentful or peevish, but rather suffers much within his own heart. A word of encouragement and a reemphasis on the realities of life have helped Fr. Thomas to see how he must strive to live in community. He has two very fine character traits. One, a deep reverence and respect for his superiors and elders; and, secondly, a fine sense of gratitude, which quickly expresses itself in a gracious 'thank you' for the smallest help or favor extended to him. From all that I know his spiritual attitudes are good. He has several uncles who are priests.

Dear Father Abbot,

I have been thinking over the idea of going into vocation work this past week. The more I think about it, the more I feel unqualified for such a job. As of yet I have little experience, nor do I have the educational background necessary for such work.

In talking to some of the people of our parish I found out that they feel that St. Bernard's is just a training ground for young priests.

Most of the people don't like the idea of a priest coming for a year or two and then being pulled out. This has happened quite often here at St. Bernard's.

I felt that when I left your office I left you with the impression that I didn't like parish work. Believe me, Father Abbot, I do like it and I feel I have done something for the people. Father Ildephonse and I have worked very much as a team on many of our mutual efforts. I enjoy teaching and working with both the grade and high school students. I have started several organizations and belong to several neighborhood groups working for better education and for the improvement of the Rice Street Area.

I feel that Father Boniface mistrusts me (treats me like a baby, is what I told him), but I have learned to live with this. Believe me, it is not all his fault. I often provoke him when I spurt out with my ideas, but I have learned to keep my mouth shut until asked a question. In spite of my personal opinion, I know that Father Boniface has done a great deal of good for St. Bernard's. Eis health hasn't been too good this past year. I imagine that his ordeal during the 2nd World War has left a few scars, both physical and mental.

Father Boniface no doubt told you that we have no regular housekeeper. Catherine, who was here for ten years, retired last summer. Since then we have had a succession of women who in one way or another just didn't work out. I don't mind making breakfast and lunch, but a chicken dinner is a little out of my line. Mrs. Burnhardt, who cleans here, has taken over the evening meal now, but we really need a full-time woman to run the household.

If you would permit me to do so, I would like to finish my education credits and perhaps do more traching in our high school here. I don't know If I could ever fill Father Romuald's shoes, but I'd certainly be willing to help him.

Father Abbot, I will do whatever you want me to do. However, I thought it best to express my feelings about the matter.

Dear Fr Abbat

This year I've decided to write a longer Christmes message than usual. The reason for this, of course, is that so many things have happened to se in the peat year. And by for the biggest change in my life is being here in Puerto Rico, working as a prefect and English teacher at San Antonio Abad, a monastery And six year college preparatory achool for boys.

As I look over the four and one-half years of my prisathood I realize how in many respects I am very fortunate. These years have brought as three different essignments, all of them concerned with slightly different epostolates. I'm gretsful for my two previous essignments and very satisfied with my present one. As you probably remember I spent two years at St. Bernard's Parish and High School in St Paul and two years as Assistant Vocational Director and Retreat Director at St John's.

Interruptions will plague this letter since I have very little consecutive free time. I'm in the study hall now prefecting my 120 minth and tenth graders. I also have some eighth graders. Generally they are a very normal group of youngsters and at various times they make quite a mass out of things. (I just kicked one kid out of the study hall for talking away while I am trying to write this letter.)

My first assignment, from 1964-1956 at St Bernard's, was a time of initiation and a sure way of getting "my feet wed and my sore dried." Here so third assistant I worked in the high school and grade school, taught and supervised C C D Classes, worked in various civic and church dramizations and of course baptized, married and buried. St. Bernard's, for those of you who don't know it, is a rather large parish in the Rice Street Area of St Paul. It was with a great deal of sadmess that I left St. Bernard's and the many friends I had there, to become Assistant Vocational Director in August of 1966--exactly two years from the date I had been samigned to the parish.

Returning to St John's efter two years. I found it a little hard at first to adjust to momestic life again. But at the same time I enjoyed seeing all my old friends and classmates again and meeting the new members of the community.

Vocational work today is a very difficult job because so few young people seem to be thinking about the priesthood or religious life. Nevertheless, these two years were filled with many valuable experiences in decling with young people, and, I hope, in helping them. I left several days later for Minnesote where I packed up and said goods by the my footly, relatives and folenos. I had to be back in Puerto Rico, ready to teach, on September 14th. Yesterday marked the third month of my besing here.

borking here in Puerto Rice has so far been a fascinating experience, as different in many ways from Minnepota. I'm junior varsity prefect here and I epand seat of my day with the studenta, teaching English to eighth graders, prefecting a study hall and dorm, nursing colds and more throats, and working as a pert-time apason couch and introduced moderator.

Two of the most fescinating things about Puerto Rico are its climate and its language. Being in the tropics the temperature seldom gets below 75°. (Today, December 15, I took a mini-tus load of students to one of the besches on the Caribbean See which is about fifteen minutes every from our school.) There's sumpline most of the day, but we do get lots of rein, usually in the form of quick showers.

The Spenish language both fessinates and frustrates as. About 90% of the standard here speak Spenish as their primary language. And of course the surrounding people also speak Spenish. I'm studying Spenish (even taking lessons) and I hope poweday to be able to apack it fluently. Right now it is difficult for sea to speak or understand it. During Christmas vocation I plan to intensify my efforts, especially on vocabulary. My students laugh at my efforts a little, but at the ease time they help me with pronunciation and seaning.

Christnes this year will be quite different for me, sepecially since I a so far every from my family and friends. I can imagine that I will be innesces for ance and the usual Minnesote Christnes.



Dear Father Abbot,

I didn't make it for the retreat and haven't been at St. John's lately, but I have wanted to talk to you or at least tell you how things are going for me at this time.

I have been here at St. Bernard's now for nearly a year including the time I spent in California at Santa Barbara. I really think going back to a place you have been before is difficult. I think I have tried to adjust and adapt to St. Bernard's again (perhaps Mel would disagree), but find it very difficult. As you remember, I wasn't particularly happy about being sent here and felt sort of like I was being pushed out of Cold Spring because Brennan and Joel needed places.

The question I have sometimes is this: "Am I really needed here at St. Bernard's?" Mel does a good job of running things. I really believe he has made St. Bernard's financially sound. He and the secretary really run the place.

I guess I am saying that I would like to get out of here, but still have lots of fears as to where you might send me and what kind of a job you might ask me to do. At this point I do not wish to return to St. John's and work there. I would prefer parish work or chaplain work. Also I think it would be tough on me to go way up north. Last year Daniel talked to me about Red Lake and I went up there with Gordon. I didn't think I could take it then, and don't think I could now.

Joel Kelly and I are very good friends and I suppose this letter in some way was influenced by his leaving. It was a real shock to me, but we promised each other to keep in contact.

As you remember I was in the mental health unit of the St. Cloud Hospital for a month in October of 1975. I guess I was pretty sick at the time. It was a tough experience and painful, but at the same time a good experience as to finding out a few things about myself. I still have periods of depression, but who doesn't. I guess the big difference now is that I can handle them in much better ways.

Fr. Cosmas and Fr. Edwin are not difficult to live with, just a little strange. I don't find any of them to be much companionship for me since none are active in sports, although Cosmas gets plenty of exercise. Mel makes a lot of jokes about my interest in golf, tennis, bowling and other activities.

I hope this letter finds you in good health. I hope you are getting out and hitting a few golf balls now and then. My game isn't very good, but I do enjoy getting out there. Right now the weather is just too darm hot to do much of anything. I have been painting the halls in the rectory, but decided today was just not a day for painting.

Plane provides priest freedom

There's a priest in Stillwater who loves to fly and claims that when he's soaring through the heavens, he feels "closer to God."

Father Tom Gillespie of St. Mary's has logged more than 350 hours of flight time in the four years he's been piloting single-engine planes. And though he may feel "closer to God" while in flight, there's no time to talk.

"You're so busy when you're up in the sky, with the instruments and the radio, that all there's really is time to do is tell God, 'Thanks for letting me do this,' " said Gillespie of in-flight praying.

He's experienced no freedom as deep, no beauty as great, as he has from his cockpit, he says.

"It's a freedom you can never feel on land," he says. "I can go pretty much anywhere that I want, without roads...

"It's hard to describe, but the beauty you see is like a panorama, especially here with the St. Croix River and all the lakes..." he says smiling and wistfully gazing out the window of his rectory office. On the wall among others bang two pictures, one of a Cessna and a Musketeer, the two single-engine planes he owns in a cooperative with 25 others. The cooperative filers call their group Trailwinds and are based at the Lake Elmo Airport.

He talks of how preity the fall landscape is from the air. "And a few weeks ago," he continues, "We went flying low, up the St. Crolx, and the smells of spring were coming in the plane; you know, from the trees budding below, and the river...

"One of the most beautiful, spectacular things you'll ever see is the landscape flying toward Winona and La Crosse," said Gillesple, talking of all "the rolling hills."

Now 44, he was ordained at St. John's in 1964. For the first two years of his priesthood he taught at St. Bernard's in St. Paul. Then he traveled in vocational work for two years before going to Puerto Rico. He came back to the U.S. in 1975, worked in various congregations and five years ago came to St. Mary's in Stillwater.

He grew up in Minneapolis with a brother, who is now a priest in St. Louis, Mo., and two sisters. His father passed away years ago, and his mother, who refuses to fly with him in her 83rd year, lives in the family home in Minneapolis.

Gillespie has taken several parishioners for flights already and plans to bring more. He also likes to play golf and tennis in his spare time,

Gillespie said he's heard of a few other brothers that fly, but only knows one personally, who flies in the The day of the interview, a robin hops on spindly legs across a neatly-cropped lawn, stopping to puff out an orange chest, then skipping away.

Near the door hang twin pots of wildly blooming geraniums. The doors are 12-foot white ones with impressive, ornate handles. Father Gillespie, smiling, opens the door before it is knocked.

Though he has little time to talk to God while in the air, he draws deep feelings from his flights and occasionally directs them into his sermons.

"I remember flying home from a long flight, late at night, and seeing the beacon flashing green and white in the night 20 miles away, and feeling that it's the nicest thing," Gillespie says, "I try to compare that beacon to God, and to safety."

And he sometimes compares the trust that a pilot must place in instrument ratings—and how important that is when you're in clouds of fog or can't see—to having faith in God.

Gillespie got his first taste of flying while working as a missionary in Puerto Rico. He was a teacher in a boarding school there from 1968 to 1975.

"I guess flying is something that I've wanted to do since I was a kid," he says. "I never really had the opportunity to fly, though, until I came to Stillwater and my friend Jim Anderson, who lives in Marine (and owns several planes), kind of goaded me into it."

Gillespie came to Stillwater in 1978
and now has a parish of about 500. He

was licensed to fly in 1978.

He remembers that his first solo flight unleashed a freedom he never before knew.


"One of the most thirlling moments."

I've had in flying is when the histructor, stepped out of the plane and said 'it's all yours," the priest said, smiling again.

He also remembers well touching down after his first sole and how his shirt was ripped off his back in the traditional salute to those who have just earned their wings.

The father lives in a neat brick house behind St. Mary's, amongst pine trees and carefully pruned shrubbery. Flowers bloom colorfully in gardens and around a statue of the Virgin Mary, swathed in light blue atone.

St. Mary's Church sits sedately next door. The huge clock on the steeple announces the time, with pigeons roosting in a hole under the numeral six sent awinging each time.

Dear Abbot Jerome,

I am writing to you about our new pastor in St. Joseph, Fr. Thomas Gillespie. Without consulting the appropriate advisory bodies, he has terminated the contract of our parish's liturgy coordinator. I believe his action was ill-advised and imprudent; moreover, it is causing more discord than it purports to correct.

has directed the St. For the past thirteen years Joseph Church choir; I have known her since college days, have sung in the choir for six years under her direction, and have observed her work is a professional and decisive woman who has firsthand. Mrs. transformed the St. Joseph choir from a mediocre group of amateur singers into an accomplished ensemble with a large repetoire of liturgical music. As a recognized leader in the field of liturgical ministry, she has shown how a small parish can use its talents to become an example of liturgical excellence. She brings to her work a firm belief in the message of the gospels and has inspired the choir to become a microcosm of a loving, forgiving, believing Christian community: we socialize together, pray together, support one another in times of sorrow and pain, as well as sing regularly as part of our church's liturgical celebrations. We are ordinary Stearns County people who have learned how to rise above our own has made us see in ourselves the dignity and limitations; Mrs. goodness we have been created with. She has taught us to act and to sing from those depths.

I describe this at length because I believe to love one another in this manner is what Christianity is all about. It is one of the first purposes of parish leaders, I think, to foster this kind of community.

Yet without warning, has been fired. We choir members have asked why but have been given no satisfactory answers. Mrs.

we know, has a strong personality—she is articulate, and she works herself harder than she asks others to work. We in the choir know her strengths and we know her weaknesses. Anyone whose beliefs are this strong and who advocates change as she does disturbs some people. And when some people are disturbed, rather than speak to the issues causing the disturbance, they personalize their disagreements, criticizing individual traits or style. I believe the latter has become the case in our parish. For some it is far easier to turn against a person than to admit their own inflexibility. It is sad that Fr. Gillespie's action has fueled that meaner instinct in our parish and has dignified it with credibility.

How can Fr. Gillespie know the intricate workings of our parish in eight months? Fairness to all demands time to achieve an appropriate perspective for action; common sense requires that other voices be heard before decisions are reached. The standards for justice have been violated in our parish, I think, by an arbitrary exercise of power. For eight months our pastor offered no warning, neither to our director nor to the choir; had he consulted with us, he could have benefited from our

long relationship with our director, learning how to smooth out rough spots, how to appreciate her talents, and how to learn from her example. Without warning we have had our director taken from us, wreqking havoe with all she has accomplished over the years.

The pastor held an open discussion last week with the choir. He offered no satisfactory explanation of his action. All he would say is that Mrs. has caused "controversy" and "difficulties" in the parish. The allegations were not backed up with evidence. No reasons were given for her dismissal; ironically, he only praised her work.

The purpose of this letter is to ask you to intercede in the name of fairness and openness for the St. Joseph Catholic community. Persuade Fr. Gillespie to reverse his decision. Convince him to allow to continue to direct our choir and act as liturgical coordinator. Help him to understand that such swift, ill-advised decisions drag our parish back into the pre-Vatican II mentality that we all have worked so hard to overcome. I ask you to help our community to regain some of its former trust and goodwill.

OBVIOUSLY WE HAVE WORK CLOSER WITH MRS THAN ANY OTHER GROUP. IF A CLASH OF PERSONALITIES IS THE ISSUE, THIS IS UNACCEPTABLE. NO ONE CAN DENY HER QUALITIES AS A LITURGIST. AS IN ANY FAMILY OR WORKING SITUATION COMMUNICATION IS THE ANSWER TO THESE DIFFICULTIES.

AFTER THIRTEEN YEARS OF LOYAL SERVICE THIS ABRUPT ENDING OF A CAREER IN OUR PARISH IS UNJUST. IN FATHERS WORDS HE SPENT A GREAT DEAL OF TIME FIRING MRS
HOUSE A GOOD FIFTEEN MINUTES". THIS IS EQUAL TO ONE YEAR A MINUTE. DOES THIS SOUND COMPASSIONATE?

SUNDAY I RECIEVED THREE CALLS FROM MEMBERS OF OUR PARISH WHO COULD NOT ATTEND SUNDAY MASS IN OUR CHURCH BECAUSE OF THE RELATIONSHIP THAT NOW EXISTS WITH OUR NEW PASTOR. WE HAVE LOST THE STABILITY OF OUR LITURGY. THE STRUCTURE OF OUR CHURCH HAS BEEN BRUTILY DEMEANED. THIS LACK OF COMPASSION IN OUR PASTOR LEAVES ONE TO BELIEVE HE IS NOT A TRUE MINISTER OF GOD'S WORD.

FR TOM HAS STATED, " FR MATT AND I ARE LITURGIST WE DON'T NEED ANOTHER. IF THIS IS TRUE THEN I HAVE TO ASK WHY ST. JOHN'S CONTINUES TO SUPPORT DEGREES IN LITURGY FOR LAY PEOPLE. OUR CHURCH WILL ONLY SURVIVE IF PRIESTS STOP THIS STRUGGLE FOR ABSOLUTE POWER AND LEARN TO SHARE IN COMMUNITY.

FR. TOM GILLESPIE HAS WOKED ONLY EIGHT MONTHS IN OUR PARISH.
IT IS HARD TO BELIEVE HE HAS BEEN ABLE TO EVALUATE AND UNDERSTAND
THE NEEDS OF OUR PARISH. I ASK YOU TO PLEASE CONSIDER SPEAKING
WITH FR. AND CONSIDER RENEWING MRS CONTRACT. THESE
TWO ADULTS NEED TO SIT DOWN AND WORK OUT ANY DIFFICULTIES THEY
MIGHT HAVE. I FEAR THE SPLIT THIS DECISION WILL CAUSE
IN OUR PARISH WILL BE AT LEAST AS DESTRUCTIVE AS IT
WAS IN ST. PETERS PARISH IN ST. CLOUD. MINN. THIS PARISH
IS STILL IN GREAT TROUBLE.

Dear Bishop:

It is with a heavy heart that I write you this letter. I was looking forward to celebrating with you at St. Joe for Confirmation on May 14.

Unfortunately, I was presented with a letter by the Pastor, Tom Gillespie, this week stating that he did not plan to renew my contract. He made the decision all on his own, with no prior consultation with me, the liturgy committee, or the parish council. The reason he gave was "it's time for a change". He would not offer any explanation, nor had he indicated any difficulty throughout the eight months we worked together. While I recognize that a pastor has that authority officially, to use it, in the way he did strikes me as very unjust and contrary to the command "love one another".

After thirteen years of excellent service to the community, both myself and members of the parish ought to have had an opportunity for discussion to decide if indeed it was time for a change. When people have a choice in their destiny, they are more willing to find creative solutions to difficult decisions. When a single authority uses power to bring about change, no one wins, and it always leads to chaos. The choir and parish members are very upset.

I feel very sad, angry and more and more disillusioned by the priesthood as I believe the whole system perpetuates this kind of "power" attitude. So many similar situations have happened to my peers (most frequently, women) and now myself. All the work, care and desire for good liturgy seems for naught, as the lay people in many cases seem more concerned about good liturgy than the priests. And, there is no accountability for the clergy! It leaves one in a very hopeless position. I feel I deserved better treatment.

Because of the close community and loving relationship we shared as director and choir, we decided we would be unable to finish singing for this year. We would all be in tears and end up being a distraction to the celebration.

Thus, I will not see you at Confirmation. I feel cheated of this opportunity as I wanted to celebrate with you one more time as you retire.

Dear Parish Council Members:

I was stunned by the letter delivered to me by the Pastor of St. Joe Parish stating he would not renew my contract. He stated that it was his decision, Fr. Matt had concurred, and the reason given was, "it is time for a change". I had no prior indication that anything was wrong.

I personally find it terribly unjust to be cut off by the decision of one person who has only been in the parish eight months. While I recognize that the pastor has that authority officially - to use it strikes me as being contrary to the gospel command to "love one another", and to the Parish Council's Constitution, Section I; "The Church, whether in the sense of the universal Church or as an individual parish community, is to be a sign of God's presence...of healing, reconciliation, forgiveness, compassion, love, brotherhood (sisterhood), freedom and human dignity.... The responsibility of the Parish Council is to facilitate the mission of the parish as the sign of God's presence in our midst...."

I find these words empty and hollow in their meaning as applied to me.

If indeed it was time for a change, then at minimum the person involved ought to have had some opportunity for input as well as the liturgy committee and parish council. Here was an opportunity for openness, honesty, and evaluation to be dealt with constructively and with concern for all people involved. Right now there is no structure for this process to occur. When people have a choice in their destiny, they are more willing to find creative solutions to difficult decisions. When a single authority uses power to bring about change, no one wins and it always leads to chaos. The process one uses to achieve an end is as important as the product. (i.e. decision)

I feel very oppressed by the attitude since shared by Fr. Tom with choir members stating that I was difficult to work with. The implication is always that I am at fault. Who ever questions what difficulties the pastor has in a relationship because of what he brings to it? I am so tired of being beaten on.

I know in my heart that I carried out my responsibilities as Liturgy/Music Coordinator with professionalism, dignity and charity. I feel very much at peace with who I am and how I did my work. I feel very good about the fine liturgy and excellent music program that was developed under my leadership. St. Joseph was looked to as a model by parishes in this diocese and beyond. I worked harder than most people would have for the minimal salary I received. When difficulties arose, I was always willing to deal with them openly and honestly. I was willing to acknowledge my inadequacies, to change and to grow. I was thrown many barbs and criticisms over the years, as any innovator usually is. I tried to handle them with dignity and care.

I am feeling punished for having done a good job. I believe that if there was a breakdown it was often caused by the lack of ability or unwillingness of pastors and parish groups to find the truth or inform the people about why something was done or changed. It became convenient to blame for things I had nothing to do with. I also believe I have been a victim of sexist attitudes against women and the larger issue of jealousy.

Right now I feel angry with God for giving me a gift in liturgy and music and for St. Joe Parish making it so difficult to use. It was always the beautiful people in the choir and a few key parishioners who kept me going. I don't know that I'll ever be able to use these gifts in the church again. I feel too beaten, broken, and hurt to think I could have the courage to do so.

I deserved better from St. Joseph Parish and the clergy who pastor it.

I know you have become aware of the situation of not renewing my contract at St. Joe and the manner in which it was handled. I waited until my anger was worked through and the tears over this huge personal loss for me were shed, before writing to anyone.

The enclosed copy of my letter to the Bishop informs you somewhat of where I stand. Georg with my copy to Farren Council.

The purpose of this letter is to request an opportunity to sit down with you personally to discuss a number of issues. Actually, I've been wanting to do that for several years. This incident has moved me to act.

The issues I wish to discuss include:

- 1. An opportunity to share my perspective of what has just occurred at St. Joe, as I believe that it is going to create a huge devisiveness in the parish and it might help to be informed of both sides.
- 2. A possibly larger issue concerning Fr. Tom, which I do not feel free to put on paper, but which I believe influenced this action and which in the long run may present some real difficulty.
 - 3. Discussion of the larger issues of:
 - a) lack of liturgical formation and understanding by clergy at large - Benedictines in parishes specifically - with recommendations and insights from one "in the field" with "grass roots experience".
 - b) need for training pastoral clergy in managerial techniques as lay people become more and more involved.
 - c) brainstorming the idea for possible alternative viable worshipping communities, and possible involvement of Benedictine community in such.

I, <u>William Raymond Gillespie</u> a/k/a Thomas W. Gillespie of Stearns County, Minnesota, revoke any prior wills and codicils, and make this my will.

ARTICLE ONE PAYMENT OF EXPENSES AND TAXES

- 1. My personal representative shall pay from the residue of my estate:
 - 1.1 the expenses of my last illness and funeral, valid debts, expenses of administering my estate, including non-probate assets;
 - 1.2 any estate taxes except to the extent paid from other sources, provided that the estate taxes paid by my personal representative shall be apportioned in accordance with the directions set forth in the General Governing Provisions.

ARTICLE TWO SPECIAL GIFTS

- 2. I make the following special gifts:
 - 2.1 I give all my tangible personal property to Saint John's Abbey, Collegeville, Minnesota (Order of Saint Benedict).
 - 2.2 I give to Saint John's Abbey, Collegeville, Minnesota, all interests in property used by me for residential purposes and in all real estate contiguous to or used in connection with such property, other than tangible personal property.

ARTICLE THREE RESIDUE

I give the reside of my estate, consisting of all the property I can distribute by will and not effectively distributed by the preceding provisions of this will, except any property over which I then have a testamentary power of appointment, to Saint John's Abbey, Collegeville, Minnesota.

ARTICLE FOUR FIDUCIARY SELECTION

4. The following provisions shall apply to the selection of fiduciaries:

ARTICLE SIX GENERAL GOVERNING PROVISIONS

- 6. In applying the provisions of this document, the following shall govern:
 - 6.1 Definitions.
 - 6.1.1 The abbot of Saint John's Abbey is the person duly elected by the monk of Saint John's Abbey and duly holding the office of abbot at the time of my death according to the norms of the canon law of the Roman Catholic Church.
 - 6.1.2 The administrator of Saint John's Abbey is the person duly appointed if the office of abbot is vacant to govern Saint John's Abbey at the time of my death.
 - 6.1.3 "Tangible personal property" means tangible personal property including money having value in excess of the face value but excluding evidences of indebtedness, documents of title, securities and any property used in a trade or business.
 - 6.1.4 "Estate taxes" means any estate or other death taxes that become due because of my death, including any interest and penalties but excluding generation-skipping taxes.
 - 6.2 Rules of Construction.
 - 6.2.1 Governing Law: Except as altered by this will, the law of Minnesota shall govern the meaning and legal effect of this will and the administration of my estate. Except as otherwise provided, all references to applicable law and Minnesota Statutes are to those in force on the date of my death and shall incorporate any amendments and successor provisions. References to the Internal Revenue Code are to the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended. References to a particular section of the Internal Revenue Code shall incorporate any amendments and successor provisions.
 - 6.2.2 Captions. Captions are for convenience only and are not intended to alter any of the provisions of this instrument.
 - 6.2.3 Gender. Where appropriate, the masculine includes the feminine, the singular includes the plural, and vice versa.
 - 6.2.4 Writing. The requirement that a person act in "writing" requires a dated written document signed by such person.

Pastor comforted family during tragedy

Lately we have heard so many sensationalized reports in the press about the Catholic Church and its clergy that we are failing to recognize the good many of the area priests do in today's frightening society.

Approximately six years ago, Father Tom Gillespie OSB came to the St. Joseph Parish. Upon his assignment here, the parish he was currently serving, Stillwater, wrote a petition asking that Father Tom be allowed to remain there. The petition was denied, and Father Tom moved to St. Joseph.

During his stay here, Father Tom has become very close to our family and many other families in the St. Joseph Parish. In August of 1992, our daughter was diagnosed with a brain tumor; a tumor which threatened her life and had to be operated upon immediately. As soon as my husband, daughter and I received this news, we contacted Father Tom. He came first to comfort the other children in our family and then he came to the hospital and spent the evening with us praying and anointing our daughter Jackie.

The next day, during a grueling, frightening seven-hour surgery, Father Tom spent much of his time with us, despite commitments elsewhere.

In the days and months that followed, Father Tom made repeated visits

to our home and to Minneapolis Chilren's Hospital to comfort us as Jackie endured chemotherapy and the pain of her illness.

Finally on November 13, Jackie was transported from Minneapolis Children's back to the St. Cloud Hospital in a comatose state. Father Tom brought our other children to say their good-byes to Jaclyn, then, once again, anointed her. She died during the night,

Needless to say, he has been a great source of strength for our children, my husband, myself and for Jackie. We do believe that God brought Father Tom into our lives at this particular time to help us through a difficult ordeal. We needed his quiet strength and gentle demeanor.

According to Psalm 36:11 we must "keep up your kindness toward your friends, your just defense of the upright of heart." We must, on many occasions, defend the clergy who keep "upright of heart." Their goodness and charity to others should not be overlooked, primarily because the press seeks to make headlines about those few members of the clergy who do wrong.

Father Tom is a prime example of an upright man, seeking to do good in a society which makes it almost impossible.

We thank God that he allowed Father Tom to be here with us during these difficult days.

Collegeville, Mn. (_____, 1996). A civil lawsuit (or civil lawsuits) of sexual abuse has (have) been filed against Father Thomas Gillespie, O.S.B. and Pather Cosmas Dahlheimer, both monks of St. John's Abbey. The lawsuit(s) concerns allegations of sexual abuse of a male minor during the mid 1970's.

When the allegations against the two monks were first reported in late February, 1996, to Abbot Timothy Kelly of St. John's Abboy, he immediately implemented the abboy's policy regarding such allegations without requiring verification of the claims. Counselling has been offered to the young man.

Father Dahlheimer, age 87, has been retired in the monastery's health center at Saint John's for seven years. Because of his frail physical and mental health, he is confined to the health center. Father Gillespie, age 58, was recalled to the monastery from the parish of St. Joseph in St. Joseph, Mn., where he had been serving as pastor, when the Abbey and the Diocese were notified of the accusation. An investigation into the claims is underway.

The Saint John's monastic community is saddened by these allegations and reaffirms its pledge to respond immediately and effectively when any such accusation is made against a member of the abbey. When the allegations were reported, Abbot Timothy reaffirmed, "The first concern of the monastic community is to offer care and counselling for the person making the complaint. Because sexual abuse and exploitation are unquestionably deplorable, this community continues to follow every detail of its 1989 policy on sexual abuse."

Statement to be Read at All Masses At St. Bernard's Parish, St. Paul

The ______ St. Cloud Times (or St. Paul Pioneer Press or Minneapolis Star Tribune) reported civil lawsuits of sexual abuse which have been filed against Father Cosmas Dahlheimer and Father Thomas Gillespie, monks of St. John's Abbey in Collegeville. The lawsuits concern accusations of sexual abuse against a minor who was a St. Bernard's parishioner in the mid-1970's when the incidents are alleged to have occurred. Father Cosmas and Father Thomas are former associate pastors at St. Bernard's.

When the allegation of abuse was first reported in late February, 1996, to the Abbot of St. John's Abbey, he immediately implemented the Abbey's policy regarding such accusations. Abbot Timothy has offered counseling to the person making the complaint, who is now an adult. Father Cosmas, age 87, has been retired in the health center at Saint John's for seven years. Because of his frail physical and mental health, he is confined to the health center. Father Thomas, 59 years old, was recalled to the monastery from the parish of St. Joseph's when the complaint became known to Abbot Timothy and Bishop John Kinney of the St. Cloud Diocese. An investigation into the claims has been undertaken.

During the last several years, Saint John's Abbey has undertaken a number of initiatives to intervene immediately when sexual abuse charges are made, regardless of the substantiation of those charges. The goals are to care for a victim's needs to help achieve healing, to deal quickly and responsibly with those accused of perpetrating the abuse and to take every step possible to prevent sexual abuse. Saint John's has announced the availability of victim's advocates to care for the needs of victims.

Today Saint John's Abbey reasserts its pledge to respond immediately when an accusation is made against a member of the monastic community. Sexual abuse and exploitation are unquestionably deplorable.

The Saint John's monastic community wants parishioners of St. Bernard's parish to know of its deep concern for anyone who has been sexually abused, for his or her family, for the parishioners of St. Bernard's. To provide an opportunity to deal with the pain and anger which many of you may be feeling, there will be a meeting for parishionersAbbot Timothy Kelly and Father Kevin McDonough will be present to answer questions, respond to concerns and to pray with the parish.

Please support one another and pray for God's blessing and peace.

Well, I've been here for over two weeks now and things seem to be going fairly well. I want to thank you for your support and encouragement. It has been very important to me. I see some here who seem to have very little support back home, especially some who are diocesan priests. So I thank you and the community for backing me.

I am trying to do my best. In a way I think I have to thank you for giving me the opportunity to be here and learn a lot about mysef. I hope that I can again be a contributing member of St. John's after my return. I am already planning my support system.

I have not heard anything from my lawyer, Bob Stich, so I am hoping that all is going well in some way or another. I am trying to realize that I have no control over that part of my life, only what I am doing right now and in the future. The serenity prayer really helps and I say it over and over again.

We have had an unusually cool spring here in the Washington area. We are all looking forward to warmer days and less rain. During the first month you are not allowed to go out on weekends to visit Washington, so the weather is not too important to me right now. I have two more weekends that I have to stay here. Then I can go to Washington on Saturday and Sunday and see some of the sights. In a way it is nice being so close to the Nation's Capital. But of course I would rather be in Minnesota.

Brennan will be coming on the 23rd according to what you told me. I am a little bit uneasy about it, but I know it will all work out. Other similar situations have happend here and things are working well. I am working on that with my therapist, Caroline.

My mother is doing well and I call once a week to talk to her and my sister. We didn't tell my mother all the details of why I am here, just talked about depression. But the rest of the family knows some of the story.

Take care now and hope you are doing well with you health. I miss being on all the committees and being vicar.

You received my June Abbot's Letter by now so I won't repeat a lot of things said there. One thing I would like to reiterate, however, is my thanks to you for your work of the past and your excellent cooperation under these difficult circumstances. I, Thomas III. Gillespie, freely enter into this Contract for Continuing Care with the Continuing Care Department of St. Luke Institute (SLI). This contract takes effect upon my discharge from in-patient care on October 8, 1996.

At the end of six months, this contract will be reviewed in consultation with the Continuing Care Department. Any change that they deem appropriate will be made at that time. In addition, it is understood that this contract will be shared with the abbot of my monastery and the prior.

The terms of the contract are as follows:

Psychosexual Health

- 1. I will maintain as my bottom line, complete sexual abstinence and sobriety.
- 2. I will avoid being alone with boys and young men (10-18 yrs old). I will make sure at least one other adult is present. Neither will I associate as a friend with boys.
- 3. I will attend three or four 12 Step SCR or SRR meetings per week.
- 4. I will, within thirty days, form a Support Group consisting of 5–8 support persons, including the prior of my community. I will arrange to meet with this Support Group and a member of St. Luke's Continuing Care Department within two months after departure and share with them my story, my Continuing Care Contract, my budding signs and my intimacy needs.
- 5. I will avail myself of the help and assistance of my Support Group by meeting with at least one of them weekly, via telephone calls, social events, or planned meetings. I will keep them informed of my plans and ask them for reality checks.
- 6. I will, within 60 days of departure, find an SCA or SLAA sponsor and faithfully utilize his help.
- 7, I will select a therapist and begin meeting with that person weekly within 30 days.
- 8. If at all possible I will meet with a bloenergetics therapist once a month.

Emotional and Social Relationships

1. I will continue to deepen my relationships with my close friends through social $ilde{ ilde{r}}$ interaction, sport activities and communication.

2. I will strive to make new age appropriate friends, both men and women, and strive to broaden my friendships and interests.

Spiritual Health

- 1. I will select a spiritual director within 30 days and will meet with that person at least once a month.
- 2. I will select a prudent confessor and go to confession monthly.
- 3. In addition to the monastic schedule of prayer I will set a time in the morning and evening for private prayer and reflection.
- 4. I will include Twelve Step literature as part of my regular spiritual reading.

Physical Health

- 1. I will have regular medical, dental and eye checkups as appropriate.
- 2. For the first six weeks I will limit my weekly work to 25 hours. My work schedule will never exceed 35 hours after that time and for the duration of my contract.
- 3. I will follow the suggestions of my nutritionist, Karen Stone, in eating and drinking only what is healthy for me. I will seek prodent companions to help me deal with appropriate eating patterns.
- 4. I will maintain a healthy exercise and sports program by exercising at least three times a week. I will also set aside time for flying and working on airplanes as an important part of my physical and emotional health.

Accountability

- 1. I will be accountable to the abbot and his delegate, the prior, for my dally routine and my whereabouts. If I am leaving the campus I will Inform the prior as to when I am leaving, where and with whom I will be, and when I will return. I will not go to the gym for exercise or playing sports unless accompanied by an appropriate adult. Neither will I go into student dormitories unless visiting a member of the monastic community who will be expecting me at that time.
- 2. I will also be accountable to my spiritual director, my Sponsor, my therapists and my support group.

Continuing Care

- 1. I will host a re-entry workshop for myself and my support group to be chaired by my Continuing Care Therapist.
- 2. I will contact my continuing care therapist once a week in the interval between

my departure and my re-entry workshop as a means of supporting me in the early stages of re-entry.

- 3. I shall renegotiate the terms of this contract as needed and/or at the time of this contract's expiration. Contract changes will be sent in the form of a letter to my superior following continuing care sessions.
- 4. I will participate in eight aftercare workshops, the first six semi-annually, the final two annually.



Also, I'm unsure how Richard Oliver fits into any of this.

I reiterated to Tom, but he doesn't here me, that this is not about money or cold cash. It is about accountability and making sure the abbey is getting done what it needs to get done. It is important to have Tom be productive for his sake AND for the abbey's sake. Tom is angry with me right now. But I can live with that.

I'm the only one on abbot's staff that defended Tom and said I don't worry about him, and that he keeps busy and productive. Yet, I'm the one that he ends up getting angry at. Well, it goes with the territory.

Bulletin Statement for St. Mary's and St. Michael in Stillwater - July 13/14, 2002

I am very sorry to have to report some sad news to you. Recently we received a call from the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis notifying us that Father Thomas Gillespie, OSB, a member of the Benedictine Community of St. John's Abbey and a former pastor of St. Mary's Parish, had been accused of sexual abuse. The allegation concerned an incident with a male minor which occurred in 1978 or 1979 when Father Gillespie was pastor of St. Mary's Church in Stillwater, Minnesota between 1978-1986.

When the accusation was first made in 1996, Father Gillespie was pastor of St. Joseph's Parish in St. Joseph, MN. As soon as the Abbey became aware of the allegation in 1996, Father Gillespie was removed from St. Joseph's Parish and he returned to the Abbey. The Abbey affered counseling help to the victim and the matter was settled out of court. Father Gillespie is restricted from having contact with young people. He now resides at the Abbey, and is no longer able to perform any ministerial functions.

The abbey has addressed the following message to the parish: "The Abbey is deeply saddened and apologizes for harm that this incident brought to the victim and to the parishioners of St. Mary's, and once again pledges its unequivocal determination to respond immediately to victims."

Recent allegations of abuse in our Church have been a heavy burden to bear for all of us who love the Church and its sacraments. Yet, decisive actions are being taken to resolve this crisis and to restore trust in our priests and religious.

If anyone in the parish wishes to discuss these concerns, please contact me. Let us all support one another and pray for God's blessing and peace.

Dear Father Tom:

I feel foolish sending this letter to you but I want you to be aware of something that has come up in the past week.

On June 27, 2003, Mr. John Kerwin from Minneapolis, MN brought an Unlawful Detainer Complaint to the Stearns County Court House. He is claiming that as a Catholic he has part ownership, with the Catholic Church, of the property of Saint John's. Based on this claim of being a stakeholder in Saint John's he is requesting the court to order the eviction of all our men who are on restriction. This is clearly a frivolous legal action.

We have asked Mr. Ron Brandenburg and Mr. Mike Ford from Quinlivan and Hughes law firm to represent us and to argue the case. Specifically, Mr. Mike Ford will appear before Judge Skipper Pearson at the Saint Cloud Courthouse on July 10, at 9:00 a.m. and argue that this legal action should be thrown out immediately.

Murphy's Law (Anything that can go wrong, will go wrong, and at the worst possible moment) is powerful, of course. For example, the Saint Cloud Times just happened to be scanning the reports from the court and noticed this legal action. As a result, it seems likely that the Times will run an article this weekend. We have asked Ron Brandenburg to act as our spokesperson on this case because he knows the parameters and issues on which the case hinges. If a reporter calls, simply note that our legal counsel is acting as our spokesperson on the case because he best understands the issues and say no more. If we express our true feelings (or, more accurately, if I express my true feelings), it will only add fuel to the fire.

Again, I am sorry to intrude into your life but I did not want you to be surprised by news of this legal action.

Abbot John, thank you for your reply and your backing of my request to do the program in Rome. You said you had no reservations, but thought the Review Board might have some.

I have sent letters to my support group asking them to write you and the Review Board about their thoughts on this learning and spiritual journey. I have asked them to support me to you and the Review Board.

I feel there is a big difference between my request and those of Fran and Francisco. I am not asking you to go some place to work, but merely to study and hopefully enhance my spiritual life. I would be happy to share my story with someone trusted by you in Rome. I have also found out there is an English 12-step meeting I could attend while in Rome.

Although I have by no means been a perfect monk since returning to St. John's in 1996, I have tried hard to fit into the community and be a useful and productive member. I have learned new skills and found other ways of "turning a lemon into lemonade."

What am I doing? I spend at least six hours a week in janitorial work. I help maintain and clean our cabins in

spring and fall. I'm also called on to do special jobs in housecleaning from time to time. I am responsible for all the signage on the campus. This can be very demanding at times. I am a web designer and a webmaster for a number of sites, including St. Benedict's Monastery and St. Paul's Monastery. In this I work closely with Bro. Richard Oliver. I very much enjoy the challenge of learning new things in web development. I also am a fulltime first responder on our fire department. My job is driving trucks and providing water. I know my job well and practice often. I also volunteer in the Retirement Center, helping take care of our older fathers and brothers and say mass for them at least once a week. I believe I deserve the opportunity to participate in the program in Rome in April. I hope for your approval.



I have been connected with Tom Gillespie since 1960 when we were young monks of the abbey; later we worked together on the staff of St. John's Preparatory School and we were together for four years at Monasterio San Antonio Abad as confirers working in the Abbey's School; during his treatment time at St Luke's Institute I visited him and the program and I have continued as a member of his support group since he completed the program at the Institute. I attended all of his support group meetings since his return from St Luke's. Tom has been a positive force in our community during the last ten years as well as exemplary in the way he continues to move forward regardless of the limitations placed upon him.

At every turn Tom has used the restrictions put upon him as a way to find new avenues for a life of quality as a monk of the Abbey. He has done a good job of making sure his social relationships are with adults. He has discontinued completely any contact with younger acquaintances as he has followed the guidelines that he developed in his St. Luke's program.

The renewal program at San Anselmo will enhance his efforts at forming relationships with other other adults. He will be living in a more structured community during this month than he currently lives in as the participants do the program as a group. And the program itself will have its interaction time when Tom can continue to receive and give the support to which he is currently accustomed.

The program will be an added boost for Tom as he refreshes his monastic journey with the lectures and the pilgrimages which will allow him his first visit to the key sites for the origin of the Benedictine tradition. Dear Abbot John:

I am writing this letter to you concerning Father Thomas Gillespie's request to participate in the Monastic Renewal Experience Program at Badia Primaziale Sant'Anselmo.

As you know, I have been a close friend of Tom's for many years. We have shared many things over the years. He drove to visit me when I was Administrator of St. Gregory's Abbey, OK, and when Prior at St. Augustine's Monastery, Nassau. He helped me move to my present location in metropolitan Washington, DC. We have spent many hours together talking, playing golf and bridge.

When he was first accused of sexual abuse of a minor he chose me as his support person. I visited him while he was at St. Luke's Institute and was part of his support group when he returned. Even after my leaving for Nassau and then Washington, DC, we have stayed in close contact and spent time together each time I come home.

As you know, I have worked with many persons who have sexually abused minors. My current position continues to involve this work on a national level and also to work with superiors of individual communities. I am part of the mixed commission of bishops and the Conference of Major Superiors of Men in deciding how the Charter and Essential Norms will apply to men religious. I process for religious superiors cases of dismissal or dispensation of religious who have abused minors.

I am also very well acquainted both with the Monastic Renewal Program at Sant'Anselmo and with Father Jacques Cote, OSB, the director.

I strongly recommend that you give permission to Tom to attend this program. He was accused of one incident of sexual abuse some years ago. There has never been a repeated

incident. He has worked hard on his program while at St. Luke's and thereafter. After returning from St. Luke's, Tom integrated well into the monastic life here. He has continued to contribute in so many different ways to the work and the life of the community. For seven years Tom has proven that he is not a danger to children. He has grown in his own understanding of his sexuality. His friendships are with adults. They are strong and healthy.

Tom lived and worked most of his life away from St. John's and most of these years in pastoral ministry. He has now been back for seven years living the life at the monastery and growing more aware of his monastic vocation. The renewal program at Sant'Anselmo is meant for a monk like Tom who is renewing his understanding and commitment to the monastic way of life.

From my own knowledge and experience of Tom, from my working on what the foundational principles of the Charter and Essential Norms are (the protection of children and young people), I find no reason that Tom should not be allowed to participate in the Monastic Renewal Program. In fact, I believe that it would be a positive continuation of is recovery program. It would help him deepen his monastic vocation and the reasons why he chooses to remain a monk.

It is my understanding, Abbot John, that you present such requests to the External Review Board for their input and recommendation. I hope that you will share this letter with them so that they may make a recommendation based on the present facts of Tom's life.


I am a monk of Saint John's Abbey and have been since 1958. I am also a priest. I was ordained to the priesthood in 1964.



I am responding to your letter of August 5, 2005 in which you request permission to participate in the Recyclage program at Sant' Anselmo in April-May of 2006. With the risk assessment and safety plan work now accomplished and in place, I am granting you permission for this trip. Please understand that it was never an issue between you and me. Without the work with Project Pathfinders in place, I didn't have solid ground for making an affirmative decision in these crazy times.

Father Wilfred, your companion, needs to be in the role of supervisor on this trip. That is, he needs to know enough about your situation and the safety plan that he can verify that your conduct is in agreement with that plan.

You made two additional requests, the first regarding assisting at community Eucharist during the week and eventually on weekends as well; the second, being allowed to use the exercise equipment in the Palaestra when accompanied by other monks. I need additional time to respond to these two requests but will do so within a month.

Per our meeting in July, I would like to meet with you and Bob Stich to have a fuller conversation about the past and how you understand what happened.

As you may remember, Saint John's Abbey was engaged in mediation with Mr. Jeffrey Anderson from January 24-27. In the course of those four days, the abbey team (Mr. Bob Stich, Mr. Mike Ford, Brother Brad Jenniges, Father Jonathan Licari, and me) listened to the stories of twelve survivors. We worked with a mediator in order to arrive at financial settlements, nine of which came to resolution. The others are still in process.

In addition, Mr. Anderson came to the mediation with what he calls "non-economic" demands. A central one of these demands is the publication of the names of monks who have had credible allegations brought against them. As a team we have struggled mightily with this issue and have not come to resolution.

I am asking you to come to a meeting with Mr. Bob Stich on March 11, Friday afternoon, at 1:00 PM in the Abbot Alcuin Conference room. As legal counsel, Bob wishes to meet with you to explain our situation, to answer questions, and to listen to your concerns. At some point, Mr. Mike Ford, Father Jonathan, and I will join you to conclude the meeting, which will end by 3:00 PM. I realize that this is short notice for such a meeting but the need for it became apparent today. Thank you for your assistance in this important matter.

- 3. If Mr. is receiving counseling or treatment, would you please identify the provider and indicate whether or not pastoral assistance is desired.
- 4. Your letter indicates that Father Gillespie was at a parish in Stillwater at the time. I believe that would be within the Archdiocese of St. Paul. If that is correct, have you notified the Archdiocese and what is the involvement of the Diocese of St. Cloud?

The above information is necessary to identify the liability insurer and provide it and St. John's with the details of the information currently available. I expect that Continental Insurance will be the liability carrier involved for St. John's, but the coverage situation still has not been resolved and I know that it will want more specific information before it responds.

On February 23, 1996, I received a letter from Jeffrey R. Anderson of Reinhardt & Anderson law firm dated February 21, 1996, advising that was reporting sexual molestation by Father Thomas Gillespie 18 years earlier when was 14 years old. He is now 32 years old. I immediately asked Father Rene McGraw to come to my office so that we could contact our lawyer about the case. Father Rene is the one who handles such cases for the abbot with the attorneys.

I then called Father Thomas Gillespie at the parish in St Joseph, Minnesota where he was pastor, and asked him to come to see me right away. He came within about 20 minutes. I showed him the attorney's letter. I asked him to choose some other person, another monk if possible, to be his support person and when he had done so to tell me who that person was. He named Father Dan Ward.

Father Thomas remained at the monastery until we could reach Father Dan and when he arrived at my office I showed him the letter as well. (A letter had arrived at the parish in the mail that morning as well but he had not as yet received his mail.) Father Dan Ward is an attorney. Until such time as we could contact the bishop of the Diocese of St Cloud and learn of his wishes I asked Father Dan if he would be willing to stay with Father Thomas and he agreed to do so. This was also agreeable to Father Thomas.

I called the chancery office of the diocese to speak with Bishop John Kinney but he was away that morning. I then talked with the Vicar General of the diocese, Msgr. Daniel Taufen. He said he would talk with the bishop when he returned later that morning and would get back to me. He called around 12:20 or 12:30 P.M. to inform me that he and the bishop would call me that afternoon at 2:30.

When we talked at 2:30 P.M. on the telephone it was the bishop's decision that Father Thomas be relieved of pastoral responsibilities immediately and be placed on administrative leave. I informed Father Dan Ward of this since he was at the rectory with Father Thomas at St Joseph. Father Thomas was not immediately available for a conversation but I did repeat the message to him some minutes later. Father Dan remained with Father Thomas at the rectory over-

night and after packing necessary belongings Father Thomas returned to the monastery Saturday afternoon.

On Saturday morning I called Msgr. Taufen and asked if he could contact the bishop and tell him I was nominating Father Dan Ward as temporary administrator of the parish and asking if the bishop would appoint my nominee. Shortly thereafter Bishop Kinney called me and agreed to the appointment.

The following week I made arrangements with St Luke Institute in Suitland, Maryland, to do an evaluation of Father Thomas. They have accepted him for evaluation and he will leave for the Institute on March 16, 1996; the evaluation will begin on March 18 and will end on March 22.

Since then Father Thomas, has been living in the monastery.

Friday, February 23, 1996, was the first I had ever heard of any allegations of sexual misconduct against Father Thomas Gillespie. It came as a total surprise to me. I did a thorough investigation of his files and found nothing that would suggest any prior knowledge or hint of misconduct on his part.

It is our understanding that the Summons & Complaint has not yet been served upon the Order. We, therefore, do not have knowledge of the specific allegations being presented by However, given the aforementioned language concerning bodily injury neither expected nor intended from the standpoint of the insured we will not be able to defend or indemnify either Father Cosmas Dahlheimer or Father Thomas Gillespie. The allegations clearly involve acts of an intentional nature which are not covered by the insurance policy.

With respect to defense of the Order of St. Benedict, we must remind you that CNA accepts the defense under a full and complete reservation of rights. If during the course of our investigation it is determined that the Church had prior knowledge of the alleged sexual propensities of either priest and that no steps were taken to prevent such abuse from occurring, we will have no alternative but to withdraw from the defense of this lawsuit.

We would also like to remind you that the insurance policy in question affords liability insurance coverage of \$500,000 per occurrence. The Order, therefore, faces exposure over and above the policy limit. You may wish to retain separate counsel, at your own expense, to protect your interests over and above the limit of insurance.

The therapy is considered necessary because he presently suffers from Post-traumatic Stress Disorder related to past sexual abuse by members of the Order of St. Benedict. It has an impact on his ability to do his job

comfortably, using the bathroom with others, sleeping comfortably, not being preoccupied with recollections of the past abuse, quilt, shame, etc.

I saw initially on 2/22/96 and it is my professional opinion that he would benefit from therapy treating the PTSD symptoms and issues resulting form the past abuse. His insurance does not cover this therapy and so a request is made for authorization of therapy related to this issue.

The therapy generally runs in three stages with the first being weekly one-hour sessions for assessment, review of the abuse story and treatment of related symptoms. This should last about six months. Second stage is bi-weekly to continue the first stage's process and should last about six months. Stage three is once per month for follow-up to maintain the gains made in therapy and should last about one year. Total length of therapy will probably last up to two years. Cost per therapy hour is \$95. Other therapy related services are also charged and are detailed in the enclosed Fee Schedule.

This total therapy could be longer or shorter depending on other strengths or stresses that may occur during the treatment period. In the years to come, it has been observed that survivors will return to therapy for a brief period in response to developmental stages or stressors that are reminiscent of the abuse scenario.

I spoke with Mr. Fallon on May 15th in response to his letter of May 6, 1996. He asked that I write to you detailing the additional information which Mr. Anderson provided by phone to me on February 23rd, shortly after his written claim notice.

Mr. Anderson stated that his client was abused on one occasion in the rectory of St. Mary's, Stillwater. The incident involved rubbing and simulated anal intercourse, with ejaculation, by Fr. Gillespie. Penetration did not occur. According to Mr. Anderson, the incident happened sometime during the summer following Fr. Gillespie's transfer from St. Bernard's to St. Mary's. That would have been the summer of 1978.

Mr. Anderson also claimed that had been fondled several times at St. Bernard's by Fr. Cosmas Dahlheimer, a year or two before the Gillespie incident.

; allegations are the first ones made regarding Fr. Gillespie. I believe that you are aware that three other individuals have made claims and commenced lawsuits against Fr. Cosmas Dahlheimer, with the first one that of made in about 1989 against the priest, the Archdiocese, St. Bernard's and St. John's. The other two cases involve the Diocese of St. Cloud. Fr. Cosmas provided deposition testimony in the St. Cloud

cases wherein he stated that he had never been involved in sexual abuse activities with anyone. Fr. Cosmas is now about 87 years old and very feeble. I don't know the current state of his memory and mental capabilities.

I hope that the information is of assistance to you in identifying coverage and arranging for pastoral assistance.

At his request, I am enclosing for Mr. Fallon, a copy of my April 16th letter to Dr. Bera. Other than Mr. Anderson's February 21st letter notification of the claim and his March letter requesting immediate pastoral assistance, I have received no correspondence from him. Dr. Bera has not responded. The only telephone conversation I had with Mr. Anderson was that of February 23rd detailed above. I don't know if has sought any treatment following the initial evaluation by Dr. Bera at the direction of attorney Anderson.

- 4. At all times material, Defendant Father Cosmas Dahlheimer (hereinafter referred to as "Father Dahlheimer"), was a Roman Catholic priest educated by, ordained in and under the direct supervision, authority, employ and control of Defendant Order. Further, at all times material, Father Dahlheimer was contemporaneously under the direct supervision, employ and control of Defendant Archdiocese.

- 7. From approximately September 1973 through May 1982, Plaintiff John Doe attended St. Bernard's Catholic Elementary and High School. At all times material, Defendant Archdiocese owned, financed and operated St. Bernard's Catholic Elementary and High School.

- 8. From 1973 through 1978, Defendant Father Dahlheimer, at the direction of Defendant Archdiocese and approval of Defendant Order, was assigned to St. Bernard's Church as a parish priest and was required to provide periodic religious instruction at St. Bernard's Catholic School.
- 9. Plaintiff John Doe came to know, trust, admire, respect and revere Defendant Father Dahlheimer as a Roman Catholic priest, his teacher and spiritual advisor.
- 10. From September 1974 through May 1976, Plaintiff served as an altar boy for St. Bernard's Church and, in particular, served as an altar boy under the supervision of Defendant Father Dahlheimer. - 12. At all times material, Defendant Father Gillespie was employed as a priest at St. Bernard's Catholic Church and as a photography teacher at St. Bernard's Catholic Elementary School. Plaintiff John Doe came to know, trust, admire, respect and revere Father Gillespie as a Roman Catholic priest and as his teacher, mentor, and counselor.
- 13. In 1977, Defendant Father Gillespie was transferred from St. Bernard's Church to St. Mary's Church in Stillwater, Minnesota, a church within the geographical confines of the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis. After his transfer, Defendant Father Gillespie continued his relationship with Plaintiff John Doe.

- 14. During the years 1977 and 1978, Plaintiff John Doe visited Defendant Father Gillespie at St. Mary's Church. In the course of their relationship, Defendant Father Gillespie engaged Plaintiff John Doe in sexual contact on the premises of St. Mary's Church Rectory.
- 15. Prior to the wrongful acts committed upon Plaintiff John Doe 19A, Defendant Archdiocese received numerous reports of misconduct similar to the misconduct alleged herein involving other priests within the Archdiocese. Despite these reports, Defendant Archdiocese failed to take reasonable measures to properly supervise priests assigned to the positions within the Archdiocese.
- As a direct result of the sexual abuse and sexual exploitation, Plaintiff John Doe has suffered and continues to suffer severe emotional distress, embarrassment, loss of self esteem, humiliation and psychological injuries, was prevented and will continue to be prevented from performing his normal daily activities and obtaining the full enjoyment of life, has sustained loss of earning capacity and has incurred and will continue to incur expenses for medical and psychological treatment, therapy and counseling.

The sexual abuse of Plaintiff John Doe and the circumstances under which is occurred caused Plaintiff to develop various coping mechanisms which prohibited him from knowing or having reason to know that he was a victim of sexual abuse and, as a result, suffered injury. Modices of costs are realinely sent to victims, he says

CLARK MORPHEW STAFF WRITER

An attorney representing the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis says his law firm has no intention of seeking repayment of costs for the appeal of a sexual abuse case brought by a Prior

Lake man.

Attorney Andrew Eisenzimmer of the St. Paul firm Meier, Kennedy and Quinn said his office did notify the victim's attorney, Jeffrey Anderson, that there were more than \$6,000 in costs in the case of Dale Scheffler, who was 14 when he was sexually abused by the Rev. Robert Kapoun, known as "the Polka Padre."

But Eisenzimmer says the archdiocese and the priest are not asking Scheffler to pay the legal ex-

"My assumption is that no attempt would be made to collect the costs," Eisenzimmer said. "We have never made any attempt to collect the costs in any of the cases I've handled for the archdiocese. If we were to attempt to collect, we would first consult the client (the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis.)'

But Anderson, who represents Scheffler and has represented others in sexual abuse cases brought against the archdiocese, says the letter detailing the costs was an attempt to intimidate sexual abuse victims.

"It is a conscious decision by a client and his lawyer to commit an act," Anderson said. "You don't bring a motion by accident. You don't tax costs by accident. It is one more attempt by the archdiocese and Father Kapoun to victimize Dale Scheffler. When I see that being done, I just say, 'Shame on them again.'

Tim Anderson, director of com-munication for the archdiocese, said Tuesday the claim was filed by Gallagher/Bassett Insurance Services, a Chicago firm that administered the archdiocese's insurance program in the 1980s. The archdiocese is now covered by Catholic Mutual Insurance Co.

Last year, Scheffler, 29, successfully sued Kapoun and was awarded damages of more than \$1 mil-. lion. Two weeks ago, however, the Minnesota State Court of Appeals overturned the ruling, saying Scheffler had waited too long to file the case.

In the wake of a minor protest at the Cathedral of St. Paul on Sunday, the archdiocese said no local official had any knowledge

of the letter.

"If Archbishop Flynn would have known the letter from the insurance company was going out, he never would have approved it," Tim Anderson said. "The insurance company did not ask Archbishop Flynn for approval to send the letter to Jeffrey Anderson.

"We're talking about \$5,000, and

we've provided much more than that for therapy for Dale Scheffler," Tim Anderson said. "We're willing to continue that therapy even though the appeal failed. It's very upsetting to me and I'm sure, it's upsetting to Archbishop Flyon. It's a very unfortunate situation."

Eisenzimmer, the archdiocese's attorney, confirmed that Flynn knew nothing of the letter and said it was a routine practice for a law firm to tax the costs of litigation.

According to Minnesota law, the prevailing party in a civil suit can ask the court to make the plaintiff pay for out-of-pocket costs associated with the litigation. But Tim Anderson said Catholic officials have no interest in the money.

"We're not interested in collecting that money," Tim Anderson said. "And the insurance company has said they are not going to collect the money. It's just a routine action when a case may go to a higher court."

Earlier this week, SNAP, the Survivors Network of those Abused by Priests, issued a news release severely criticizing Flynn for vindictive behavior against a known victim of sexual abuse.

"This type of barassment will scare others who are suffering, and prevent them from coming forward and getting the help they need," said David Clohessy of St. Louis, national director of SNAP. "It's a newer, more vicious way for the church to keep abuse victims trapped in silence, secrecy, and shame."

Dear Father Tom:

I know that this has been a very difficult and challenging time for you and for the whole community.

Because Saint John's is a very beautiful place with great facilities, we attract and have developed outstanding programming for young people each summer. Thus, thousands of kids and teenagers come to our campus each summer. Because of all the negative publicity that we have received this spring, leaders of these various programs contacted me and asked me to speak directly to the issue of safety for the young people involved in these programs, specifically the Leadership Camps at Prep School, Youth in Theology and Ministry (YTM), National Catholic Youth Choir (NCYC), and AmericaFest 2002. So I made some promises to these groups, such as the following:

It is the policy and commitment of Saint John's Abbey to protect all children and vulnerable adults from abuse by members of the monastic community. When it does occur, our primary concern is that victims of abuse are taken seriously and receive support and healing. In addition, steps are taken to insure that those who have abused receive psychological treatment, face their issues, change their way of living, and respect the restrictions placed on them. If they are given work assignments, their contact with others who are vulnerable is restricted and their supervisors and colleagues are informed of the allegations that were made against them.

All monks who have restrictions on them because of past allegations of sexual abuse, sexual harassment, or inappropriate behavior, will have the following restrictions placed on them during the time that the National Catholic Youth Choir (or AmericaFest or YTM or Leadership Camps) is on campus. They will not be allowed at practices or performances by the choir. They will not be allowed in the dining spaces, classroom spaces, or the living areas that the choristers use. As a community we are looking forward to this third year of the National Catholic Youth Choir, (or AmericaFest...) to the wonderful growth and positive energy that is already part of its tradition.

I am sorry to have to write this to you and make this request. However, no matter how I have tried to communicate how abuse occurs, that it is not random, that you are not a sexual predator, that you are in recovery and acting with the highest integrity, this does not fit the media's template and goes right out the window.

Furthermore, travel has been a huge concern on the part of the media in relationship to those on restriction. So apart from your routine assignments, I ask that you obtain permission from your immediate superior for all travel off campus. This is a real change from our present situation and, no doubt, it will pinch. However, we do need to attend to those issues that are most alarming to the public.

We will get through this together and in a way that is consistent with the Gospel and the Rule.

During the past week, Father Thomas Gillespie was referred to in an article on sexual abuse reported in the area media. At the time of the accusation in 1996, Father Thomas was pastor of the St. Joseph Parish [in St. Joseph, Mn]. The allegation which was settled out of court concerned an incident with a male minor which occurred in 1978 when Father Thomas was pastor of St. Mary's Church in Stillwater, Minnesota

As soon as the Abbey became aware of the allegation in 1996, Father Thomas was removed from the St. Joseph Parish and he returned to the Abbey. The Abbey offered counseling help to the victim. Father Thomas is restricted from having contact with young people.

The Abbey is deeply saddened and apologizes for harm that this incident brought to the victim, to the parishioners of St. Joseph [St. Mary's], and once again pledges its unequivocal determination to respond immediately to victims.

In an effort to deal with the anger, pain, and loss which people may be feeling in our parish, there will be a meeting in the dining room of the lab school on this Monday evening, June 10 at 8:00 p.m. This meeting is only for parishioners. Abbot John Klassen of St. John's Abbey and Father Marvin Enneking, the Vicar General of the Diocese will be present here [at St. Joseph] to answer questions, respond to concerns and pray with the parish for those involved.
